

Jordan - Propagation skills benefit Rockleigh

What was your goal and what did you achieve?

I want to educate more people about native vegetation, and learn more about propagation methods for native plants. I continued running native plant club and also organized Trees for Life to do some native plant propagation which went successfully. I've worked with the club and also one of my very close friends. We managed to get 600 plants to a property at Rockleigh and were continually talking to Trees for Life about organising stuff.

Did you face any challenges?

I had some communication issues. I sent an email to someone, then you go to speak to someone else and what the other person said never happened, so you have to do the whole process again. For one email it took me about 50 emails

to get one little thing sorted, which was a massive pain. I've learned it's easier putting everyone that's involved in the email so there's no confusion.

What will you do next?

I will be continuing the project as I will be doing 14 boxes for Trees for Life in December.

Your advice to other students?

Give it a go, and if you get stuck, just ask people that you know questions and work it out from there, then you can't really go too wrong. You can always ask questions so no confusion occurs.

What did you enjoy most?

Working with other people and also learning a lot.
