

Lauren - Action group wins grant to restore trees

This case study was transcribed from an interview. These are Lauren's words and opinions.

What was your goal and what did you achieve?

This year we ended up planting 125 native trees (and other plant types) at my school. We won a grant from Roots & Shoots to buy the plants and our biggest success was getting the whole school to go out and plant them on our oval. We've now got a roster where people can come and water them every Wednesday.

Our promotion was through the newsletter and talking about it at assembly, so quite a few people know about it. Corona was a bit of a challenge because we didn't get to do it as soon as we wanted, which kind of delayed the growing time, but that was pretty much our only challenge.

Who did you work with?

I worked with my school's Environmental Action Group, the Head of Year 7, and my class, who helped plant the trees and now water them.

Your advice to other students?

If you really think that you want to do it and you know that that's what you want, keep with it because it will be hard but in the end it's really rewarding and it's fun after you've done all the hard stuff.

What did you enjoy most?

Meeting new people around the senior school and forming more relationships with the teachers. I didn't really know them because it's my first year in the senior school, so it's good now I know them.
